Resources for Recycling or Responsible Disposal

Beauty packaging

- Drop off empty containers at Nordstrom (including at Westfield Old Orchard, 4937 Old Orchard Shopping Center) and Nordstrom Rack (including at The Shops at Orchard Place, 9625 Skokie Blvd)
Accepting Cosmetic (Empty tubes, tubs, pans, palettes and twist-up containers from all cosmetics), Samples (Trial-size tubes and vials, excluding perfume), Hair care (Empty bottles, tubes and caps from shampoo, conditioner and styling products), Skin care (Empty bottles, tubes and dispensers from cleansers, toners and moisturizers)

- The City of Evanston has partnered with Recycling Avenue, an organization that provides job opportunities for the physically challenged, to collect electronic waste for recycling.

Electronic Waste

- Join our First Pres office staff in recycling old small electronics & appliances, cords, and accessories, placing them in the appropriate box in the First Pres

front desk closet. We recycle old office electronics at Abt Electronics in Glenview every six months.

\$4 per gallon fee, \$2.50 per quart fee, etc.

Medications

- As part of a program established by the Evanston Police Department (EPD) and the Save A Star Drug Awareness Foundation, residents can dispose of unwanted or unused medications in the pill collection unit located in the front lobby of the Evanston Police Department, 1454 Elmwood Ave. The building is open 24 hours a day for medication and prescription drug drop-offs.

The following items are acceptable for disposal:

- Prescription medications, including controlled substances
- Over-the-counter and pet medications
- Samples
- Vitamins
- Liquids and creams

Plastic bag & film and share-a-bag

Plastic film recycling and Share-a-Bag will be available these locations:

- Main Evanston Public Library, 1703 Orrington Ave.
- Morton Civic Center, 2100 Ridge Ave.
- Chandler-Newberger Center, 1028 Central St.
- Ecology Center, 2024 McCormick Blvd.
- Fleetwood-Jourdain Community Center, 1655 Foster St.
- Levy Senior Center, 300 Dodge Ave.
- Noyes Cultural Arts Center, 927 Noyes St.
- Robert Crown Center, 1701 Main St.

At these locations you will be able to recycle all types of plastic bag & film products, which are not recyclable in your normal curbside pickup.

- *At select locations in Evanston you'll find Share-a-Bag bins to help provide members of the community with reusable shopping bags. The Share-a-Bag bins will be located at the same facilities providing plastic bag and film packaging recycling. At the Share-a-Bag bins you can donate extra reusable shopping bags you may have, or pick up a reusable shopping bag if you are in need of one.*

More Creation Care Ideas & Resources
recommended by our FPCE Community

- Eliminate plastic food storage containers; use beeswax bowl covers, reusable ziplock silicone bags, glass containers, and produce bags. Most can be purchased at Target. Produce bags at Aldis.
- Recycle toys----toy exchange for birthdays
- Shop at Eco and the Flamingo, a zero-waste general store in Lincoln Square (4750 N. Rockwell, <https://www.ecoandtheflamingo.com/>)
- Consider cutting out or down on meat products
- Install solar panels
- Use LED lights
- Reduce gas consumption by biking, walking, driving hybrid or electric car.
- Conserve water by not watering the lawn.
- Leave grass and leaf clippings on the lawn for free mulch.
- Reduce water consumption---don't leave water running, lo-flo shower heads, etc.
- Be informed about bills designed to protect those who are most vulnerable to the effects of climate change.
