³⁹ One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, “Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!”⁴⁰ But the other rebuked him, saying, “Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation?”⁴¹ And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong.”⁴² Then he said, “Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom.”⁴³ He replied, “Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.”

Christmas Lutheran Church is our sister church in Palestine who has

been led by Rev. Dr. Munther Isaac since July 2017, though the church has had a presence in Bethlehem since 1893. Each Sunday worshipers from Bethlehem and around the world gather. Despite the conflict in the Holy Land, the church has remained relatively unharmed aside from small damage. This is a clear sign of God's blessing upon this congregation. The support you provide today will allow Dr. Rev. Isaac's mission in the church to vibrantly grow the church.

Currently, Christmas Lutheran Church is in the midst of a project to build a parking structure that will serve the church and community, particularly local businesses. They have about 2/3 of the funds raised to complete the project. As well, they are focusing on a multi-year discipleship program aimed at engaging youth and young families in their faith and commitment to growing the church in Palestine. Though a congregation of only just over 100, they have great vision and faith that God continues to honor.



All money given to this Thanksgiving offering will go directly to further the ministry of our Sister Church, Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, Palestine.

This four-week seminar will present an overview of the history of music in Christian worship, from the chanting of the pages of scripture, to the hymns of Isaac Watts, to the songs of Sandra McCracken. In this course we will trace the evolution of musical style and genre throughout the history of the church; explore how musicians, scholars, and clergy people have thought about music through the ages; and think critically about our reciprocal relationship with music, how the music we sing shapes us and our theology, and how we and the theology we espouse shape our music. Each meeting will begin with our singing Advent and Christmas music from the musical time periods we will be studying. The class will be taught by **Dr. Robert McConnell**. Robert

has worked as a church musician for fifteen years and currently serves as organist at the Church of the Holy Spirit (Episcopal) in Lake Forest, Ill. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts from Northwestern University.
